Clover seed goes four bushels per acre in rare instances and three bushels is a common yield this year. Many oat fields went fifty bushels to the acre and the straw is of excellent quality. Never in the history of this state was there such an abundance of fruit from the strawberry to the apple; fruit trees are breaking with their monster burden. Potatoes are good. Corn very promising. Most all the hay and straw has been stored away in an excellent condition. Wheat has brought a satisfactory price; corn, hogs, cattle, horses, mules, hens and eggs command in most cases better prices than they have for a generation and the farmers realize the fact as keenly as anyone. All enjoy it too, and are unanimous in the belief that this year is without a parallel from the farmer's point of view.
