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PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 6, A. D., 1906.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That at the general election for State and Legislative officers to be held on the Tuesday, succeeding the first Monday in November, 1906, the following provision be proposed and submitted to the electors of the state as an amendment to the constitution.

Section 2. There shall be a State Railway Commission, consisting of three members, who shall be first elected at the general election in 1906, whose term of office, except those chosen at the first election under this provision, shall be six years, and whose compensation shall be fixed by the Legislature.

Of the three commissioners first elected, the one receiving the highest number of votes, shall hold his office for six years, the next highest four years, and the lowest two years. The powers and duties of such commission shall include the regulation of rates, services and general control of common carriers as the legislature may provide by law. But in the absence of specific legislation, the commission shall exercise the powers and perform the duties enumerated in this provision.

Section 3. That at said election in the year 1906, on the ballot of each elector voting thereat, there shall be printed or written the words: "For Constitution Amendment, with reference to State Railway Commission." And "Against Constitutional Amendment, With Reference to State Railway Commission." And if a majority of all votes cast at said election, shall be for such amendment, the same shall be deemed to be adopted.

I, A. Galusha, secretary of state of the state of Nebraska, do hereby certify that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is a true and correct copy of the original enrolled and engrossed bill, as passed by the Twenty-ninth session of the legislature of the State of Nebraska, as appears from said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the state of Nebraska for their adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday the 6th day of November, A. D. 1906.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the state of Nebraska.

Done at Lincoln this 24th day of July, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Six, of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Thirty-second, and of this state the Fortieth.

The News says that Brown is untrue to his duty as an official because the tax case will not be tried in the United States supreme court at Washington until October. We still insist that the News is funny. Brown beat seven kinds of daylight out of the railroads in the lower court at Omaha and the railroads, as was their right, appealed the case to the United States supreme court. Does the News blame Brown because the laws of our country give every litigant the right of an appeal. Brown had the cases advanced on the docket of the supreme court so that it could be heard this fall. If he had not done this case would not have been reached for a year. When the case was set for argument in October the railroads requested Brown to grant them a six months continuance. Did he do it? Not Brown. He didn't try to wait until after election before fighting it out in the hopes that railroad influence would help him for so doing. Not he. He didn't say to himself, "Here, I want to be in Nebraska making my campaign in October and I can't afford to spend a couple of weeks over in Washington while my opponent is making hay at home." Not he. Brown is not built that way. He said the sooner we get this appeal out of the way the sooner the Burlington and Union Pacific railroads will have to pay the more than \$200,000 they owe the people, so railroad influence or no railroad influence; campaign or no campaign, there will be no continuance in the tax cases. And there is none. The News in its criticism on Brown is growing more amusing as its case grows more desperate.

Can anyone offer a good objection to Stalder. Have not the years he has lived in this county showed him to be made of the right kind of timber? Isn't he acquainted with our needs as an agricultural section from practical experience as a farmer? Isn't he in line with the reforms of the president? Will not his vote be cast for Brown for senator and aid in his election and the defeat of Thompson whom everyone knows to be the railroad candidate? In this contest between corporation candidates and candidates who will represent the people every voter should become a partisan. The railroads have taken the side which will do the most for them. The people should consult their interest as closely as do the railroads. A vote for Albert Stalder is a vote against railroad domination not only in the state but in the United States senate as well.

Cass Jones has been tried once as a member of the legislature. Have you heard anyone say a word against the record he made. He was always present, always consulting in the interest of his people. A man of proven character and ability is a good man to tie up with. Jones will answer roll call in the next legislature with the same regularity as he did before.
