## PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 6,

REST EXACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATION NERRASKAT

Section I: That at the general election for State and Legislative officers to be held on the Thesday, succeeding the first Monday is November, 1906, the following provision b proposed and submitted to the electors of the state as an amendment to the constitution.

Section 2. There shall be a State Railway Commission, consisting of three members, who shall be first elected at the general election in 1906, whose term of other, except those choses at the first election under this provision, sha be six years, and whose compensation shall be fixed by the Legislature.
