Articles of Incorporation.

Articles of Incorporation of The Falls City Park and Improvement Company:

We, the undersigned, John Lichty, W. W. Jenne, T. J. Gist, John W. Powell and W. A. Greenwald, do by these presents associate ourselves together for the purpose of becoming a body corporate under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Nebraska:

Art. I.—The name of this corporation shall be The Falls City Park and Improvement Company.

Art. II.—The principal place of transacting the business of the corporation shall be at Falls City, Nebraska.

Art. III.—The general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation shall be the ownership and management of a private park and such amusements as are naturally and usually connected therewith. This corporation is hereby empowered to own, buy and sell real estate or exchange the same when necessary or advisable to the proper conduct or maintenance of its park or improvement business.

Art. IV.—The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be Twenty Thousand Dollars of which the sum of Fifty-five Hundred Dollars shall be fully paid up when these articles are filed with the county clerk. The stock shall be divided into shares of the full par value of Fifty Dollars each and shall be non-assessable.

Art. V.—The greatest amount of indebtedness to which this corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not exceed two-thirds of the paid up capital stock.

Art. VI.—The date of commencement of the corporation shall be immediately upon the filing of these articles with the county clerk of Richardson county, Nebraska, and it shall terminate fifty years thereafter, unless sooner dissolved by vote of two-thirds of the stock issued.

Art. VII.—The affairs of the corporation shall be conducted by a board of five directors, chosen by the stockholders from among their own members, who shall choose a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer and other officers as the by-laws suggest. The first meeting of the stockholders shall be held on the day of the organization of the corporation and thereafter the regular meeting shall be held at the office of the corporation on the last Tuesday of December of each year at which meeting the board of directors shall be elected to hold office until the annual meeting next ensuing.

Art. VIII.—The board of directors shall have full power and authority to make all rules and adopt by-laws for the proper government of the corporation.

Art. IX.—These articles may be amended at any time. All amendments shall first be approved by the board of directors and ratified by a two-thirds vote of a general or called meeting of the stockholders. Each share of stock shall represent one vote.
