On Monday morning the sad news was received of the death of Grandpa Dunn in Lincoln. Mr. Dunn had been ill since last November, although he was able to be out the portion of each day until about six weeks ago when he became bedfast. The disease was the result of a hardening of the blood vessels of the head, and about ten days ago he was taken to Lincoln where he might receive the most scientific treatment possible. From the time he reached there the reports received up to the last were particularly encouraging, and news of his demise came as a shock to his loved ones. His sons, R. J. and Ira Dunn left Monday morning for Lincoln returning Tuesday morning with the remains which were brought here for interment. The funeral was held from the Big Bethel at 10 o'clock Tuesday, by Rev. Teeter of Falls City, and the body laid to rest in the Harris cemetery, followed by a large concourse of friends and relatives. Jephtha Dunn was born in the state of New Jersey, June 15th, 1833, and died at Lincoln, Nebr., April 28th, 1907, aged 73 years, 10 months and 13 days. At an early age he united with the Baptist church of which he has been a faithful member. On August 21, 1856, he was united in marriage with Susan Mittower, at Tiffin, Ohio. To this union two children were born, Ira A. Dunn and Rowley J. Dunn, both of whom now reside at Barada. The deceased leaves a wife, two sons, one brother and sister to mourn for him. The brother and sister reside at Sparta, Michigan. We extend to the sorrowing relatives our most heartfelt sympathy.
