### Sentiment and Sentimentality.

Three words in our language are confused, misunderstood and misapplied. These words are Sentiment, Sentimentality and Romance. Of these, the two that are most often confounded are Sentiment and Sentimentality.

Sentiment in itself is one of the very finest of all human attributes. It is the instinctive feeling and appreciation for whatever is noble or tender or exquisite touching in human life, in human thought or in human action. It is almost identical with sympathy, and the possession of it enables one to enter into the feelings of another and to understand them. A man of sentiment is one who recognizes not only that which is superficial in what happens, but who can look deeper down and perceive the true impulses and the genuine emotion that lie back of what is done or said.

To be devoid of sentiment is to lose everything that is most beautiful in every situation, to pass through life emotionally color-blind and to be tone-deaf to all the exquisite harmonies that pulsate through the daily life of every one of us. Without sentiment we are hard without meaning it; we are unkind without ever knowing it; and we are guilty of a thousand crudities that grate and jar without our ever being conscious of them. Sentiment looks far ahead. It feels instinctively what is coming. It molds our speech and modifies our manner through its perfect feeling for the feeling of another. It is, therefore, the soul of tact, of gentleness, of kindness.

On the other hand, sentimentality is the perversion and the abuse of sentiment, for it is sentiment run wild and uncontrolled until it degenerates into mawkishness. It illustrates the eternal truth that every virtue and every good quality, unless balanced and controlled by others, will almost infallibly become a vice. Sentiment, for instance, needs to be controlled and balanced by strength of will, by firmness, by humor and by taste. It is probably humor more than anything else that acts as a barrier to prevent sentiment from becoming sentimentality, because a sense of humor is a perpetual preventive of absurdity. It searches out the false note in everything. It bids one pause in doing or saying anything which trembles on the verge of the ridiculous. It recognizes what is incongruous or ill-timed or out of keeping. Moreover, humor is itself a part of sentiment, and sentiment always recognizes and enjoys the humorous touch and the little whimsicalities in any incident or situation. Hence it is by this that one can with the greatest ease discern the difference between the man of sentiment and the sentimentalist. The former is keenly alive to fun; the latter abhors it.

Sentiment is not loud spoken. It does not proclaim its own existence. It is seen in act far more than in mere words. It exists forever, but it is not always only displayed. It comes out at the psychological moment

when it is fitting and harmonious, and when it will surely strike a responsive chord in the heart of another. Never by any possibility can it be ridiculous. Sentimentality, however, is just the reverse. It is forever telling of itself. It is excited by the most trifling causes. It has no control over its own manifestations, and, instead of winning, it repels, and sometimes sickens. Sentiment goes with the truest manliness and strength. Sentimentality is the inevitable concomitant of weakness. Sentiment is to sentimentality what caution is to cowardice, what prudence is to stinginess, what economy is to avarice and what love is to lust.

The manifestations of each may be the same, and whether it is sentiment or sentimentality that is shown depends wholly upon the time and the occasion—in other words, upon the control which good taste exercises over the individual. Nor is the manner of the manifestation of any importance in itself. There may be more meaning in the tremor of a voice or in the deepening of a tone than in strenuous protestations of a passion of tears. The time and the moment are everything. When two Frenchmen have been separated for a week and, on meeting once again, rush into each other's arms with all the evidences of intense emotion, this is sentimentality. When Nelson lay dying on the blood-stained deck at the moment when Talfalgar's victory was won, and when he said to the devoted commander who bent over him, "Kiss me, Hardy," that was sentiment.

One of the newspaper of Peking, China, has lately celebrated the five hundredth anniversary of its establishment. During its long period of publication the editorial staff has several times been beheaded, either in front of the office or in it, for printing news which displeased the court. The expression, "he has severed his connection," may be Chinese newspaper English.—Youth's Companion.
