**The Burden of Overeducation.**  
 Discussing the problem of overeducation of the American woman, Margaret E. Sangster, in the Woman's Home Companion for March, asks and answers the question, "What Is Education, After All?"

"Is it not ascertaining how to make the best of one's powers, how to arrange one's stores, how to exert a sweet, quiet and fragrant influence throughout life, over all whom one meets? If an advanced education does this for one, then it is the education one should seek. Our

difficulty is that we cannot allow time enough for seed time and harvest. Mothers are in despair if daughters occasionally drop out of school for six months or a year. We are much too apt to insist on putting all our children, irrespective of their natural bent, through the same educational factory. We do not make sufficient allowance for temperament and tendency, and thus it comes to pass that some of us carry burdens, beneath the weight of which we are crushed."

**Market Letter.**  
 Kansas City Stock Yards, March 23, 1908.  
 Light supplies of cattle last week, together with urgent orders in the hands of buyers, gave salesmen an opportunity to administer the hardest squeezing the buying end of the market has been subjected to in many months, and advances of 50 to 80 cents were effected on steers, while cows, heifers, stockers and feeders gained 25 to 40 cents. Packers protest that the beef market is not in shape to warrant such big jumps in values for steers, but the market for beef and that for live cattle just now do not bear a very close relationship. The real test of the stability of the market came today, when the supply amounted to 11,000 head, liberal in view of recent small supplies, and the situation stood the test fine, market strong to ten higher, top steers \$6.75, as compared with a top of \$6.65 in Chicago for the whole of last week. Professional speculators and those who have been tempted by the big advance in prices lately to indulge in speculations, have raked the country for cattle in the last week, and the good run today testifies to their successful activity. The situation is top heavy, and at the first opportunity buyers may be counted on to apply the screws most vigorously. Bulk of steers now sell above \$6, a remarkable condition, considering that nearly all are short fed, heifers bring \$4.50 to \$6, cows \$3.50 to \$5.50, bulls \$3.75 to \$5, calves \$4.50 to \$6.50, stockers \$4 to \$5.25, feeders \$4.75 to \$5.50.  
 Hogs advanced 38 cents per cwt last week, and average 80 cents higher than at the close of February. Receipts dropped off 20,000 head last week as compared with the week previous, and the run today is moderate, 8,000 head. Prices are steady to 5 higher today, top \$5.05, bulk \$4.85 to \$5. Now that the \$5 mark has been passed, reasons for further advances, should they develop, will be less hotly contested than they are just before a change of the front figure. Quality is deteriorating, and the belief in strong prices seems to be well founded.  
 Sheep and lambs have participated in the general boosting of prices of other kinds of live stock lately, and prices are 25 to 50 cents higher than a week ago. Run is 8,000 today, market 10 higher, lambs at \$7.60 to \$7.75, yearlings worth \$6.75 to \$7.10, wethers \$6 to \$6.60, ewes \$5.80 to \$6.25. These figures are for woolled stock, and an allowance of 50 to 75 cents per cwt must be made for clipped stock, which has just started to move good.
