### Anti-Saloon Platform

Exulting in the advance, in the anti-saloon fight, not only in public sentiment, but in actual laws, passed and enforced, throughout the United States, we believe that Falls City can and should live without the revenue coming from the rum traffic. Towns like Hiawatha, Auburn, Pawnee City, York and hundreds of other towns, witness that, financially and morally, they are better without saloons.  
In caucus now assembled, we propose the following platform:  
First—We are unalterably opposed to the existence of open saloons in Falls City.  
Second—That the candidate of the Citizens ticket for mayor, should not be elected as he has publicly declared that saloons cannot live and obey the Slocum law, under which they will operate if licensed; the necessary inference being that he would tolerate its violation, if elected.  
Third—That we stand for law enforcement, in every particular, whether touching saloons, gambling or other evils.  
Fourth—That the administration of Mayor Abbey and the present council has been efficient, painstaking and honest. That the excess of expenditures for the electrical plant, over the amount of the bonds voted by the people was necessitated by necessary contracts made by the preceding administration and that the selection of the site for the city's water plant, was justified by tests made as to quantity, quality and convenience. That there is just reason for believing that the quality of the water is now affected by conditions which will disappear with a short period of use.  
Fifth—That we commend our Chief of Police, Samuel Marts, for his faithfulness and efficiency. That he has performed the services heretofore done by two officers, at a saving of \$600 per year to the city. That the opposition to him comes wholly from those who wish to violate the law.  
Sixth—That we will give to the people an economical and will establish conditions, which will assist our public education, our churches and our home, to advance to higher ideals than now exist.
