Arthur Warner and wife of Fairbury visited the latter's parents, R. M. Wilson and wife the first of the week.

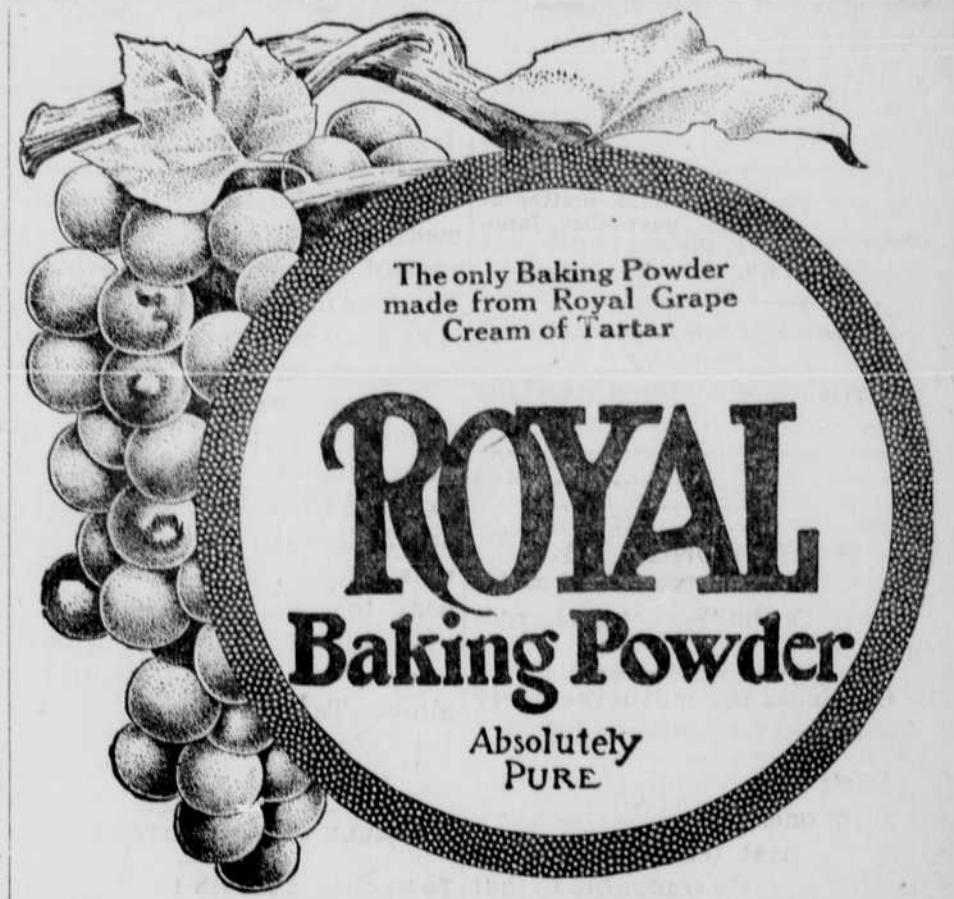
J. C. Herwig has purchased the interest of his partner, J. H. Briggs in the hardware and furniture business.
