Now, we're not going to mention any names, but the fellows who did the every-other-word "cussing" while at work down by the Central school house Monday, ought to be ashamed.

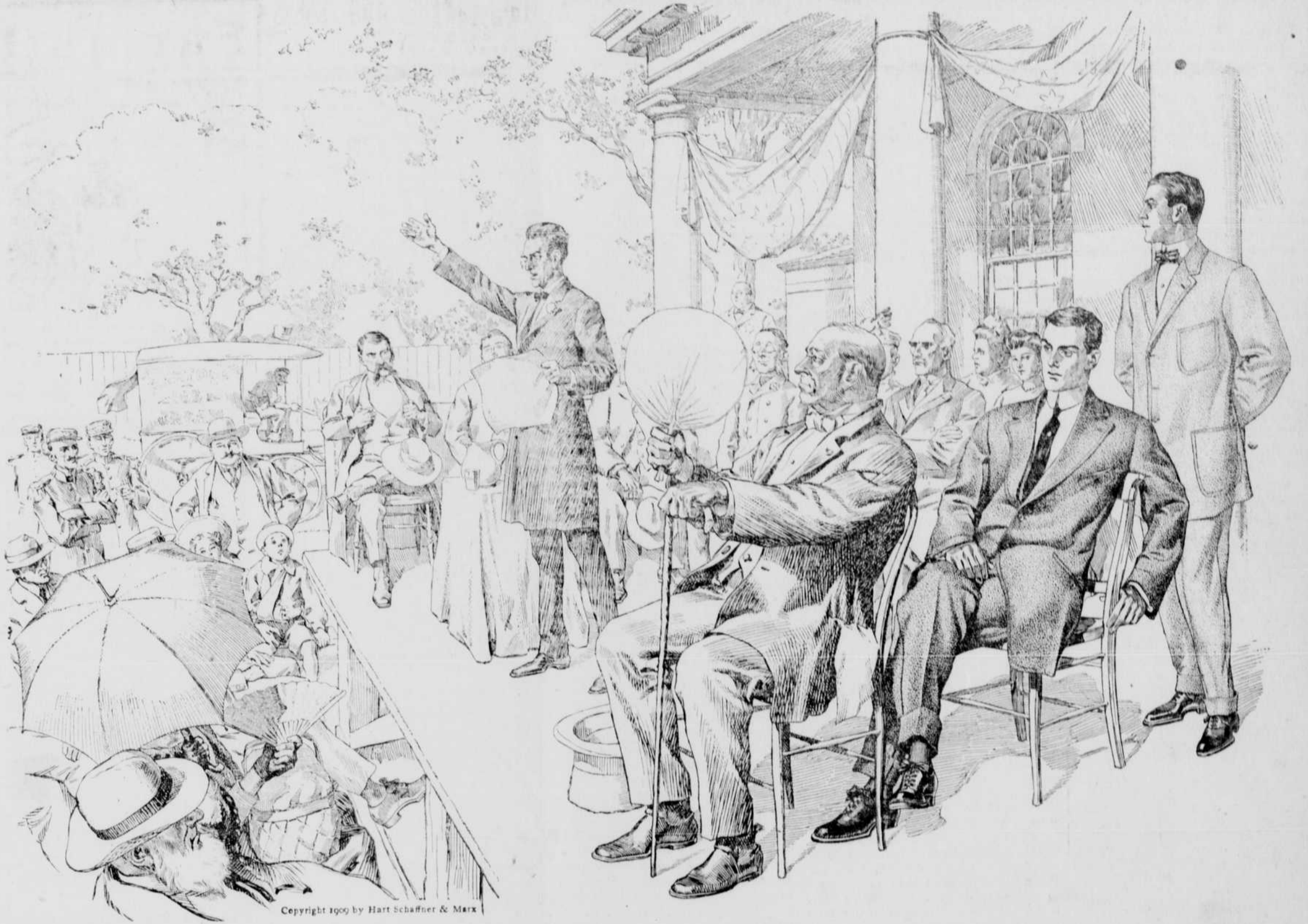
