This is the harvest time of corn shuckers. Every man or part of a man willing to go into the field can get all the corn to gather he has the courage to tackle. The crop in Richardson county is variable. There is much good corn, some moderate and some quite poor. The lateness of the season made early gathering impracticable. As a result farmers are anxious to have the crop harvested before severe weather begins. A prolongation of the present ideal conditions will be a great boon to corn growers and will not be permitted to pass without being made the most of.

Shuckers are receiving three and four cents according to locality and the condition of the corn. The wages are good and help very much in demand. There is absolutely no excuse for anyone standing around idle, with pleasant and remunerative work calling so loudly for volunteers.
