

**HONEYMOON IS SHORT-LIVED**

**Bride of Week to Hospital, Husband to Jail, After Quarrel.**

Kansas City, Mo., May 24. — John Butler, 26 years old, is at the Walnut street police station, and his bride of six days is in the General hospital suffering from a possible fracture of two ribs, the result of a family quarrel last night. When the ambulance and police arrived, the woman was in the care of some of the women roomers. Butler was located in a saloon at 815 East Fifteenth street, where he had been chased by some of the men of the neighborhood, who had threatened to lynch him.

"We were married last Thursday after two years' courtship," Butler told the police. "She left me three days ago and has been running around town. About an hour ago she called me up and asked me to meet her at 1527 Holmes street, where we had lived. I went there, and in a few minutes she showed up with two men.

"I began to remonstrate with her for the way she had been doing, and she commenced to shout for help before I touched her. It made me so mad, together with the way she had treated me, that I couldn't help striking her. I know I made a mistake but it is pretty tough to marry a woman and then have her do that way."

**PILE OF MONEY USED**

**Over Hundred Thousand Spent To Elect Lorimer.**

Washington, May 24.—Revelations concerning the election of Senator Lorimer of Illinois may be expected as the result of a second investigation into the bribery charges against him if the predictions made by Senator La Follette in the delivery today of a third installment of his argument in support of his resolution of inquiry are realized. Mr. La Follette prophesied that more than twice the \$100,000 heretofore alleged to have been used would be found to have been spent. He said President Taft's name had been used in Lorimer's behalf, and reiterated that Lorimer had had personal acquaintance of the use of money.

Mr. La Follette quoted from the testimony given by Edward Hines, a Chicago lumberman, before the Lorimer investigation committee of the Illinois legislature regarding Mr. Hines' interviews with United States Senators Aldrich and Penrose, in which Mr. Hines said Mr. Aldrich repeatedly had impressed on him the importance of Lorimer's election, and had told him President Taft was especially concerned in Lorimer's behalf.

Referring to the Hines statement concerning a long distance telephone conversation between Washington and Springfield, La Follette said that at Lorimer's request Hines had telegraphed to Lorimer the substance of his telephone representations to him. This telegram could and should be procured, he said.

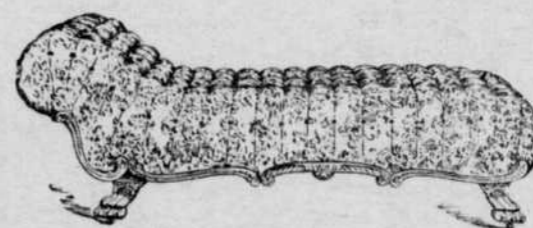
