


> "God Save the King." We have no real knowledge of "God Save the King" before the rebellion of '45, when it became a popular loyalist song, but tunes of the same shape had existed long before. One is to be found in a book "Ayres," dated a minuet by Purcell. According to another theory, the tune of "God Save the King" used to be sung in James II.'s private chapel to a Latin hymn beginning "O Deus Optime," and after the revolution of 1688 was preserved by members of the Stuart family, till it was performed publicly about 1742, on the birthday of the princess of Wales. It is interesting to find that the words "God save the king" are in Coverdale's Bible of 1535, and seem to have been used there as a familiar phrase rather than a translation. "God save the king," according to Froude, was a watchword in the royal navy in 1545, the counter-
