

School Day Cookies

34 cup Spry (the triple-creamed shortening)
4 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoon cloves
5 teaspoon cinnamon

1 teaspoon soda
134 cups brown sugar, firmly packed
2 eggs, well beaten
334 cups sifted flour
4 cup milk
5 cup figs, finely cut
4 cup raisins, finely cut

Combine Spry, salt, spices and soda and blend. Add sugar gradually and cream well. Add beaten eggs and mix well. Add 1/2 of flour, then milk, then remaining flour and chopped fruit, mixing well after each addition. Drop from tip of teaspoon on baking sheets greased with Spry. (So much easier than having to roll and cut out.) Sprinkle with sugar.
