The following from "The Scroll," publication of the Santa Ana, California, chapter of the Order of DeMolay, tells of the advancement of Courtney Chandler, former Plattsmouth resident, Mr. Chandler having just been installed as master of Silver Cord lodge A. F. & A. M. of Santa Ana.

Mr. Chandler resided here in the early twenties and was a charter member of Cass Chapter of the DeMolay, being active in that organization from its establishment in 1921 until his removal to California.

Going to California Mr. Chandler was married to Miss Cleone Meisinger, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Meisinger, who also live at Santa Ana.

"Court" was formally inducted into his high office Tuesday evening, December 19, at a public installation ceremony. The regular DeMolay meeting was called off in order that chapter members might attend the ceremonies.
