Most American Protestant churches have a denominational affiliation. Even some of the so-called community churches have a working arrangement with two or more denominational bodies. The denominational plan of meeting Christian obligations and providing numerous forms of worship and doctrinal belief has seemed to fit American characteristics.

Each society is an integral part of the church which sanctions and sponsors it, and it is presumed to have a definite place in the religicus educational plan of that church. The Christian Endeavor society specializes in helping young people to acquire information, inspiration, and practical abilities in the wide field of church work and Christian leadership. A few of its members go into full-time employed Christian vocations. The majority acquire a greatly increased effectiveness as individual, active volunteer workers.

But Christian Endeavor is also strikingly interdenominational-belonging to all the faiths. 


