BURY INDIAN WAR VICTIM

TALMAGE, Neb., April 30 (UP)—Believed to have been the last woman victim of the Nebraska Indian wars, Miss Veronica Ulbrick, 90, will be buried here tomorrow.

In 1867 when federal troops were removed from Jefferson county where the Ulbrick family was homesteading a band of Indians kidnaped her and killed her twelve-year-old brother. Together with sixteen other women and girl prisoners she was released eighteen months later in an exchange of prisoners in North Platte. A native of Germany, Miss Ulbrick came to this country with her parents in 1862 when Nebraska was infested with Indians.

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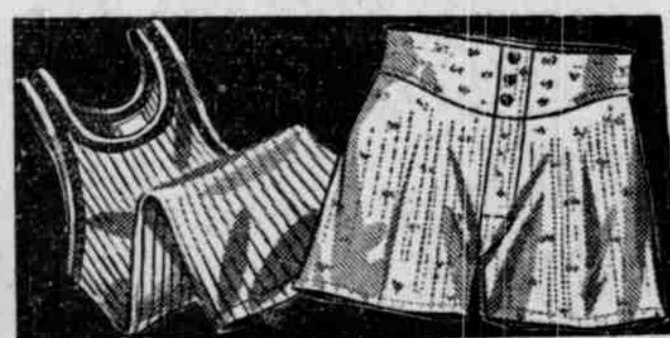
