ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the Murray State Bank of Murray, County of Cass, State of Nebraska As Amended on the 2nd Day of August, 1940—Charter No. 578

I, Charles H. Boedecker, Cashier of the Murray State Bank of Murray, County of Cass, State of Nebraska, do hereby certify that at a special meeting of the stockholders of said Bank, held on the 2nd day of August, 1940, pursuant to lawful notice thereof, duly given, the Article of Incorporation of said Bank, upon resolution duly made and adopted, were amended by striking out all of the Articles of said Bank, theretofore adopted and existing and inserting in place thereof the following amended articles, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be "THE MURRAY STATE BANK".

ARTICLE II. The principal place of business of this corporation shall be at Murray, County of Cass, State of Nebraska.

ARTICLE III. The object for which this corporation is formed is to carry on a commercial banking business as provided by the Laws of Nebraska.

ARTICLE IV. The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars, of which at least Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars shall have been paid in at the time of commencement of business, which shall be issued in shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each. No transfer of the stock of this corporation shall be operative until entered on the books of the corporation.

ARTICLE V. The indebtedness of this corporation shall at no time exceed the amount of its paid-in capital and surplus except for deposits.

ARTICLE VI. This corporation commenced business on the 1st day of September, 1900, and shall terminate on the 1st day of September, 1950.

ARTICLE VII.
