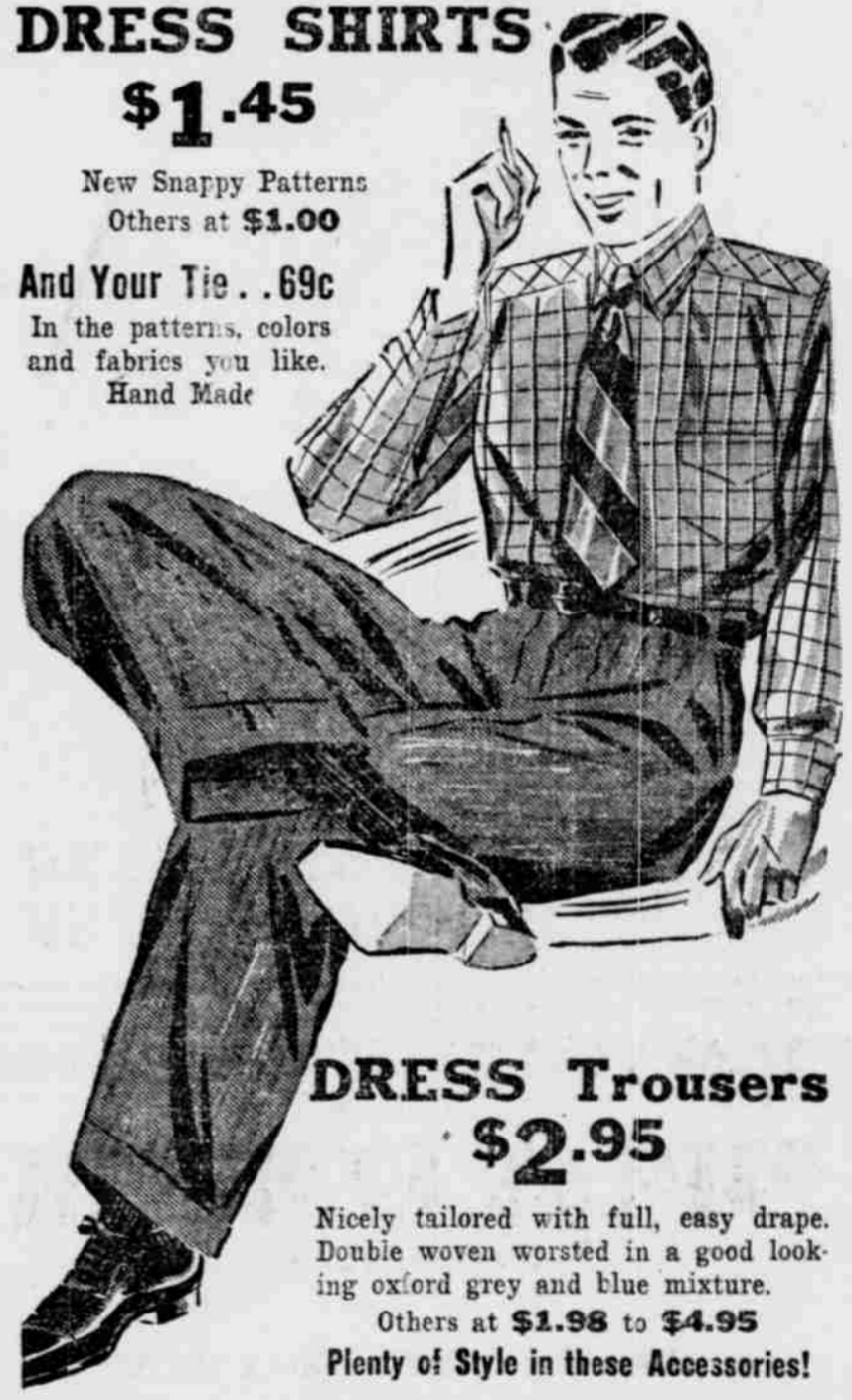
WINS GARDEN HONORS
