## Farm Family Non-Money Income

One of the factors affecting farm family living is the use of the nonmoney income. Families can realize a substantial income from their home produced products and services of the farm. Since the greater share of the family's income is spent for food, why not plan to produce more food on the farm so that the family can enjoy more of the other things so essential to good living. For example, families with moderate food expenditures paid out an average of \$27 a year for medical services as compared with \$20 spent by the families with high food expenditures. This difference does not mean that the former group had more illness; it probably seems that their needs were less adequately cared for.

The more goods and services that can be realized from the farm itself the more cash is made available for other types of purchases. The naclothing.

The 1939 farm family living chart for Nebraska tells us that the value of goods and services furnished by 31 per cent of the total living value. Can we as homemakers increase our non-money income from the farm so that we can have more cash available for things that the family may desire?

## Mineral Needs of Farm Cow Herd

According to M. L. Baker of the North Platte experimental station, under most conditions, the only mineral requirements of the farm cow herd, not likely to be supplied by ordinary feeds are calcium and phosphorous. It is probable that phosphorus is more likely to be deficient than is calcium unless grain or some protein supplement such as cottonwood cake or meal is supplied.
