The World-Herald rendered yeoman service in advertising Mr. Bryan as the savior of the West, and his brief period of service as editor of Mr. Hitchcock's newspaper was valuable to both of them. The World-Herald gained in circulation and prestige, and Mr. Bryan's name was kept prominently in the headlines. But as Bryan and Hitchcock became increasingly active in Nebraska Democratic circles, a clash of ambitions was inevitable. When Mr. Bryan prevented Mr. Hitchcock being appointed to the United States Senate in 1899, a cleavage developed that was never healed. Though the World-Herald continued to support Bryan in 1900 and 1908, it was evident that factionalism had developed in Nebraska democracy with the "Great Commoner" leading one group and Mr. Hitchcock the other.
