In the last of the first Central counted when with one out Dreier singled, Jones singled and Dreier came in on Hill's error. Plattsmouth tallied four times in the third. Nielsen fanned, Vroman was safe on Potts' error, Martin doubled, putting Martin on third, he was passed to second. Shiffer singled and Grove let it go through him, both runners scored and Shiffer took third. Parriotti struck out. Petet tripled to tally Shiffer from third. Hill struck out to end the threat.

GARDEN CLUB MEETS

From Thursday's Daily—The Plattsmouth Garden club met last evening at Hotel Plattsmouth with a very good attendance. Four attractive flower arrangements in unusual containers were in evidence, made by Mrs. L. W. Egenberger and Miss Sophia Kraeger. Flowers used were grape hyacinth, purple flag, flowering currant and narcissus. Club members discussed ways and means of beautifying Chicago avenue and Julius Pitt and A. L. Tidd were appointed head of a committee by the president, Mrs. P. Y. McFetridge to approach the city park board and Chamber of Commerce about this matter.

The spring flower show, which will be managed by Mrs. Egenberger, will be held as soon as the flowers are ready. Mrs. Luke Wilcox gave the botanical name of several common flowers such as the grape hyacinth and yucca.

Mrs. C. E. Hartford, a former resident of Plattsmouth and charter member of the Plattsmouth Garden club, who is a house guest of Mrs. E. A. Wurl, was present and was asked to say a few words. She said in Florida members of garden clubs were voted and wondered if members here realized what a privilege

it is to belong to a garden club. A large sack full of heavenly blue morning glory seeds was donated by James Nowacek and distributed among the garden club members.

For the program E. H. Maxwell of the agricultural college at the University of Nebraska, showed some very interesting slides on wild flowers and shrubs. He said Nebraskans should use their own native shrubs and flowers more for home planting because they are beautiful in their natural surroundings and fewer failures result. He spoke particularly of the Wahoo tree, the bitter-sweet, smilax or cat briar and the June Berry tree as attractive plantings and a valuable source of bird food.

10 Commandments To Guard Nation's Bathroom Towels

Joliet, Ill.—Ten "bathroom commandments" for Mr. and Mrs. America were released heretofore by research scientists of the American Institute of Laundering.

The scientists declared these rules are the "only effective defense against the fatal warfare waged by the careless family against its towels, leaving them tattered and torn."

"They added that the rules also would "remove from the professional laundry the unjust blame for resulting towel damage."

- Never stretch a towel, it weakens the fabric, tears the threads, twists the shape.
- Mop moisture from the skin; don't rub.
- Never put a wet towel in the hamper, it mildews.
- After swimming, be sure to wash away all sand, because such grit will cut the threads.
- Never dry razor blades on towels; tiny nicks become big holes.
- Never wipe shoes with towels; dirt and grit cut the fabric and stains corrode the cloth.
- Don't playfully "snap" a towel; it breaks corner threads.
- Don't use a towel to mop up astringents or medicine; they may weaken it considerably.
- Keep porcelain cleaners away from towels and other cloth.
- A towel is meant to dry the body, not the floor, use it as a floor mop and you court disaster.

Plattsmouth Boy Located at Alaska Post

Arthur Skalak Now Stationed at Elmendorf Field, Near Anchorage, Alaska, a New Post.

Arthur Skalak, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Skalak, who enlisted in the army last fall, is now stationed at Elmendorf Field, air base, near Anchorage, Alaska, where a new post is being prepared by the United States for the protection of the Alaskan territory.

Art was for some time stationed at Jefferson Barracks, Missouri, from where he was transferred to Camp Lewis, Washington, remaining there but a few days hence on to Seattle, embarking for the northwest. The men were taken on the St. Michael to Alaska and after a voyage of eight days they arrived at Seward, Alaska, later going by train to Anchorage and the new post.

The Plattsmouth young man is well pleased with the Alaska climate and states that it was 58 degrees above zero at the time of his writing and very pleasant.

The town of Anchorage has 6,000 population and is a very active place at this time. They have one of the most modern hospitals in the world at that place to care for the needs of that part of the United States possession.

In speaking of conditions the young soldier states that milk is retailing at 25c a quart.
