

Death of Mrs. Frank Hawksworth Tuesday Evening

Well Known and Highly Esteemed Lady Dies After Short Illness - Funeral Friday.

The death of Mrs. Frank Hawksworth, 64, occurred last evening at 7 o'clock at the home of Mrs. E. W. Cook, with whom Mrs. Hawksworth has made her home for the past few years. While not in the best of health Mrs. Hawksworth had not been critically ill until Tuesday morning when she suffered a stroke from which she never recovered.

Grace Hobson was born near Wichita, Kansas, on December 21, 1876, and spent her girlhood in that part of Kansas. Later she moved to Nebraska and on November 14, 1895 was married at McCook, Nebraska, to Frank W. Hawksworth, who for many years was an engineer for the Burlington. Mr. and Mrs. Hawksworth made their home in Denver for some twenty-three years until after the death of Mr. Hawksworth. There is surviving of her near relatives an aunt, Mrs. Nora Royer and daughter, Mary of Wichita. She also leaves many relatives by marriage, among them Mrs. Cook with whom there was a very deep tie of affection.

Mrs. Hawksworth was a lady blessed with a charm of personality that readily made her friends and her cheerful disposition under any trying circumstances was marked by all.

POSTAL RECEIPTS GROW

The Plattsmouth postoffice has shown a very nice increase in the receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30th over that of the year ending June 30, 1940, the reports show.

The revenue sources of stamps, envelopes, box rents, etc., for the year just closed was \$17,041.22. This is an increase of \$884.61 over the past year, which was also an increase over 1939 of \$686.82.

This shows in the two years an increase of \$1,571.43 or a jump from \$15,469.79 to \$17,041.22 for the year just ended.

Local Council to Watch Interest of Farm Families

Families with Rehabilitation Loans to Have Assistance and Advice of Committees.

A county council of local citizens to look after interests of farm families in Cass county with rehabilitation loans and to interpret local rehabilitation problems is soon to be announced for this county, according to Leonard Hanks, rehabilitation supervisor for Farm Security Administration. Such councils are being established throughout the country by the Department of Agriculture, and the department approves appointments of council members.

The new county council here will be made up of substantial citizens who are known to have the interests of local farmers at heart and who are in sympathy with the self-help program of rehabilitation loans carried on by the FSA. The council will be organized in addition to the already existing farm debt adjustment and RR advisory committees, and in addition to the tenant purchase committees now existing in all counties where tenant purchase loans are made through FSA. Membership in the county council, however, will include members of the other committees and will also include additional representatives of the community.

Formation of the new county council, it was stated, is in line with the policy of the U. S. Department of Agriculture to make the FSA program subject, as completely as possible, to local interpretation and applicable to local needs. Reimbursement of council members is to be a feature of the new localized movement.

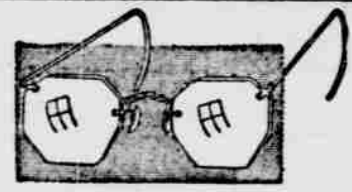
From Wednesday's Daily—
