In the office of the clerk of the district court Saturday afternoon a number of cases were filed, among them the following:

City of Plattsmouth vs. Fred and Anna Heisel and R. L. Kent, for tax foreclosure on lots 1 and 2, block 12. Young & Hayes addition. This Also a Line of Bar and Box Candy is to clear the record as to the taxes. Another action was that of Wiliam Ellsworth Rosencrans, vs. Clayton Rosencrans, in which the plaintiff asks an accounting with the defendant. The petition states that the plaintiff was presented with \$200 time of birth by his grandfather; by agreement with his mother and the defendant the amount was to be preserved and added to by gifts. It is alleged that in 1931 the amount had accumulated to \$1.000. The plaintiff became 21 years of age on October 21, 1940, and that request has been made for an accounting of the fund. It is prayed that the court make order requiring the accounting by the defendant.




