COOKING SCHOOL DRAWS MANY

The cooking school and "all electric" demonstration of kitchen comfort, given Monday afternoon and this afternoon attracted a large number of the ladies of the community, the attendance being estimated at over 100.

The school was under the sponsorship of the Consumers Public Power district, the electric power distributors in this territory. Mrs. Mabel Hildebrandt, nationally known economist from the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company in Mansfield, Ohio, conducted the demonstration.

Mrs. Hildebrandt gave a demonstration of vitimized cooking that was enjoyed by the large number in attendance, the instructor showing the preparation of foods and the electric way of cooking.

Many new ideas of cutting the kitchen costs were given by the instructor as well as the practical demonstrations. The dishes prepared by Mrs. Hildebrandt during the demonstration were later distributed to the ladies attending.

FINE IMMUNIZATION RECORD AT MURRAY

Finest immunization record made so far in the Cass-Surry health area was established at Murray on Monday, when all but one of the pupils received protection against one or more of the diseases—smallpox, diphtheria and tetanus—for which the vaccination program is being carried out in town and rural schools throughout the two counties.

Some of the children, previously immunized for one or more of the diseases, did not take the vaccination. In all there were 140 vaccinated, including rural pupils and pre-school children. Dr. R. W. Tyson gave the vaccinations, aided by Dr. L. Kling, district health officer, and the three nurses, Misses Mary G. Henderson, Ruth Martin and Helen Olson, together with Mrs. Kling, who made up the record cards.
