This was revealed in a letter from J. E. Davidson, company president, which was posted today on all company bulletin boards to thank the employees for their generous support of the Red Cross.

Every one of the 51 employees living in the smaller towns served by the company contributed an average of more than a dollar each to their local Red Cross roll calls. The 708 employees in Omaha and Council Bluffs contributed a total of \$785.50.

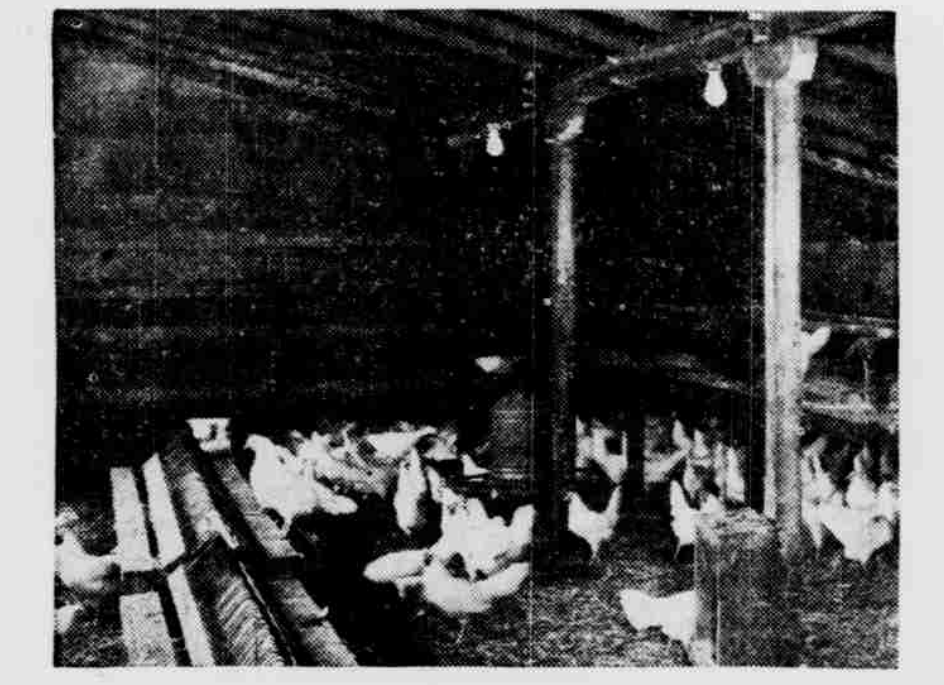
The food is served to all children of the school in the effort to promote better health throughout the school and community. This is a state-wide project.
