The "Square Dealers" composed of a group of the business girls of the city, were entertained most charmingly last evening at the home of

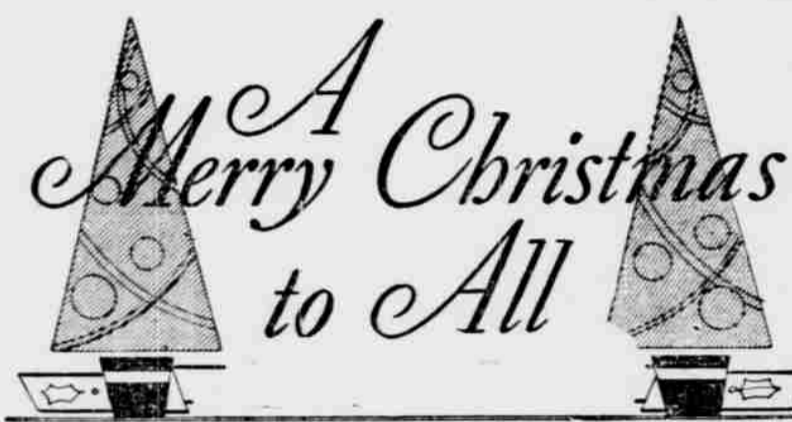
Norma and Gloria Johnson on South 9th street.
