Completes Another Ship

RICHMOND, Cal., Oct. 6, (UP)—The Henry J. Kaiser Enterprises have completed another "can't be done" project by constructing a shipyard in 64 days and launching the first vessel, a new type "tank landing ship," 61 days later, it was disclosed today.

The new vessel weighs 3,500 tons and may be used either as a military craft or cargo ship. Other details were not revealed. The construction was undertaken in addition to Kaiser's record breaking liberty ship program.

Kaiser said the first of the new ships was launched Sunday from a giant sled which was towed to the water's edge and tipped until the ship slid off.

Japanese Driven From Bases on Stanley Mountain

Australians Drive Invaders Back Forty Miles To Main Backbone of The Mountains

Gen. MacArthur's Headquarters, Australia, Oct. 5—(UP)—Australian forces are nearing the backbone of the Owen Stanley Mountains of New Guinea after taking Efogi village, last important Japanese base on the southern side of the range, it was announced today.

From the farthest point of a Japanese advance toward the great allied base of Port Moresby on the south New Guinea coast the Australians had pushed back the Japanese roughly 40 road miles to reach a point about 73 road miles from Moresby. Entering the second week of the most important allied offensive operation of the war in Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Zone, the Australians had not yet contacted the steadily retreat enemy main forces.

But they had started overtaking stragglers and continued to capture hastily abandoned Japanese equipment.

At Efogi, the Australians split their forces to cover the double trail leading up toward the hump of the mountains, one by way of Kagi, three trail miles from Efogi, the other by way of Lake Myola, six trail miles away.

Douglas A-20 attack bombers softened the way with a heavy bombing raid on Efogi, Kagi and Myola village.

Curtiss Fighters machine gunned the Japanese rear communications on the north side of the mountains.

In the only offensive activity outside the New Guinea zone, consolidated medium bombers raided the enemy airdrome on Buka Island, northwest of the Solomons, by night and without meeting aerial opposition, starting fires and causing explosions on the runway and in dispersal areas. At least one enemy grounded plane was destroyed.

In addition to capturing much Japanese equipment the Australians were now starting to retake equipment which their own troops had been compelled to abandon last month when the Japanese advanced to Iorhaiwa Village, 32 air line miles from Port Moresby.

The few Japanese whom they had not had been disposed of and doubt increased here whether the enemy would elect to make a stand on the Port Moresby side of the mountains.
