## Stop Sale of Correspondence

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20, (UP)—Charles Kohen said today that he and the Park-Bernet Galleries, inc., of New York, had withdrawn 9,000 items of White House correspondence of the Coolidge administration from auction because they feared that to reveal what was in them might be detrimental to the war effort if they fell into Axis hands.

Kohen owns the hobby shop here. The Park-Bernet galleries were to have auctioned them on October 28 but yesterday they were withdrawn and sent to the library of congress where they will remain sealed until they can do no harm.

The items comprises the files of the late Edward T. Clarke, who was Calvin Coolidge's private secretary. Clarke died in 1935.
