Rules Given For General Blackout Monday

The rules given below tell in plain language just what is expected of the people of the communities where the blackout will be tested on Monday night at 10 o'clock.

In addition to the rules it is urged that all householders that have radios operate them at a reasonable pitch that they may listen to General Uhl and others telling of the blackout of the entire seventh army corps area.

If at home, or in hotel room: (1) Turn out all external lights. (2) See that no light in your house is visible to the outside.

(3) If you cannot obscure your windows with dark materials, turn off your lights, but do not use the main switch. (4) Management of hotels and apartment houses are responsible for exterior lighting.

If it is necessary that you drive your car: (1) Immediately pull over to the curb or roadside and turn off your lights and motor. (2) Do not try to drive with your lights off. (3) Do not park in front of a fire exit, fire plug, hospital entrance or at a street intersection. (4) Do not block center of street, as fire engines and police cars need the right-of-way.

Theaters and amusement centers: (1) Turn off all exterior lights or lights visible to the outside. (2) Do not permit the opening of any exits which would expose lighting to the exterior.

Stores, manufacturing companies, and industrial plants: (1) Have some one on duty during the blackout. (2) Be sure all external lights are out. (3) See that internal lights are not visible to the outside. (4) Your presence on the premises will aid materially in protecting your property and making the test a success.

If unavoidably outdoors: (1) Remain on the sidewalk—do not cross street. (2) Do not smoke or expose any light.

Important: Do not forget your skylight, if you have one. Main switches will not be turned off—it is up to you individually to make this test a success.

If you must be away from your premises, do not leave any light visible to the outside.
