### Baby Born to Royalty

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—(C.P.)—Crown Princess Juliana of the Netherlands was doing "extremely well" today following the birth of her third daughter in a hospital suite that had been declared extra-territorial to prevent the child being born a British subject.

The baby, weighing seven pounds, 12 ounces, was the first member of the Netherlands Royal house to be born outside Dutch territory and the first member of any European Royal family to be born in North America.

Juliana's husband Prince Bernhard, was the first to be informed of the birth last night in Ottawa Civic Hospital. He immediately relayed the news by telephone to Juliana's mother, Queen Wilhelmina, in London.

Prince Bernhard said he was "very happy and very glad," although he had hoped for a male heir to the throne. He reported that the baby "looks splendid."

### Nebraskans Dead

Washington, Jan. 19.—(U.P.)—Fourteen Nebraskans were included in the list of 1,219 casualties released for publication today by the Navy department.

The preponderant share of the casualties, the department said, resulted from direct action with the enemy, but included in the total of dead, wounded and missing, are the names of those who were lost in accidents at sea and in the air on duty directly connected with war time operations.

The list covers personnel of the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast guard and covers the period from Dec. 16-31. Some of those under the classification of "missing" may have been rescued at sea and landed at isolated spots or otherwise made their way to safety at places from which they had had no opportunity to communicate with Navy authorities, it was pointed out.

Today's list brings the total of the three services reported from Dec. 7, 1941 to Dec. 31, 1942, inclusive, to a total of 21,497.
