Victory Speakers to Aid in War Bond Drive Here

Will Be Ready to Serve at Meetings Over the City to Present Need of Bond Buying

The Plattsmouth Defense Council is now completing the organization of The Victory Speakers Bureau. Some of the Four Minute Men of the last war are being asked to again take the platform for Uncle Sam. To these are being added some who were not very old at that time but who will endeavor to play their part in getting Home Front information to the home front right here in Plattsmouth.

Attorney Paul Fauquet, of Weeping Water, is Cass county chairman of Victory speakers. Will Robertson is chairman of the local Defense Council which has general supervision of all home front activities, practice blackouts, preparations for real air-raids, sale of war bonds and stamps, Red Cross work (if it needs any extra attention) and all such war time activities. Judge A. H. Duxbury is commander of these activities designed to guard against local destruction and repair such damage, should it come. Bond sales, Victory Speakers and other general war activities are not so closely organized or unified but are functioning under individual chairman.

Postmaster Milo W. Price has been designated chairman of Plattsmouth Victory Speakers. All organizations wishing to have a victory speaker appear before some meeting of the group should inform Mr. Price of their desire and a Victory Speaker will be assigned to the meeting.
