**District 4-H Camp**

Camp program and management is being handled by the extension Agents from Cass, Sarpy and Douglas Counties in cooperation with the Brewster staff. Applications must be in the Farm Bureau Office by July 20th.

**Streich Recognized**

William Streich of Murdock was cited this week for outstanding achievement in broomgrass production by the Nebraska Crop Improvement Association. The recognition was one of a series being made by the Association to help further the War Program of food production.

All of the broomgrass on the Streich farm is of the Lincoln strain, as especially good type in southeastern Nebraska. The original planting was made in 1936 and subsequent plantings have been made with seed harvested on the farm.

Mr. Streich now has a total of 29 acres of broomgrass pasture and waterways on the 240 acres of land he operates. In addition, he has 15 acres of alfalfa-broomgrass mixture which he utilizes for hay. A small amount of alfalfa is also included in the broomgrass used for pasture to help keep up the productivity.

The land on the Streich farm is rolling. With the cooperation of the Soil Conservation Service, Mr. Streich has developed a complete soil conservation plan on his farm. Broomgrass plays an important role in this program. The more rolling land is seeded down to permanent pasture. The remainder of the land is farmed on the contour and the waterways are seeded down to broomgrass. Mr. Streich will harvest sufficient seed on the waterways to take care of his needs for the coming year.

Cattle utilize the broomgrass. The present herd consists of 35 head of milking shorthorns. There are 10 milk cows. Mr. Streich annually feeds out the steer calves and some of the older cull cows from the herd.

Mr. Streich's operations are an excellent example of good farm management and sound conservation principles for his section of the state.

**Harvest Help**

Many requests for farm hands for harvest and year around farm workers are being filled rapidly but the demand is still greater than the supply. A few farmers who have asked for help in locating combines to do custom work are being helped to make necessary arrangements.

Anyone needing farm help is urged to contact this office or local labor representatives immediately.

**Soybean Pointers**

Four timely pointers on producing soybeans were suggested by D. L. Gross, Extension Agronomist this week. They are:

1. Every effort should be made to have weed-free beans. These yield higher and are easier to harvest than weedy beans.
2. Do not cultivate beans after they begin to blossom. The bean flowers are easily knocked off the stems by machinery and this means fewer pods and lower yields.
3. Make a study of the performance of different varieties as to height, size to pods, lodge resistance, disease resistance, time of maturity. These observations will help in making a wise selection of varieties for next year.
4. Ridging soybeans at the last cultivation should be avoided. Soybeans are produced very low on the stems and ridging thus causes increased waste at harvest time as a result of the sickle striking the pods.

**Watch Out For Fires**

This is the season of the year that farm fires can be disastrous and Cass County farmers are warned to be on the watch out for them. Ripe grain fields are "ripe" for fires. Last year, many fires were caused by trucks and tractor exhausts during harvest.

Plowing of fire guards around grain fields can prevent fires from reaching shocked or stacked grain and stacked hay.

**Cold Pack Canning Method**

Pack cold food into sterilized jars, partly sealing; then process. Most foods are packed raw, but if you prefer to blanch them, scald first, then dip in cold water. The jars must be tightly sealed immediately after processing. All fruits and tomatoes may be cold packed but some are more satisfactory when hot packed. Be sure all foods are thoroughly cooked and tightly sealed before storing.
