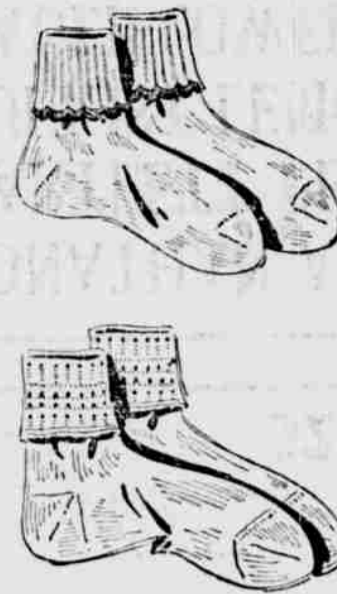
were urged to make for Russian ports.

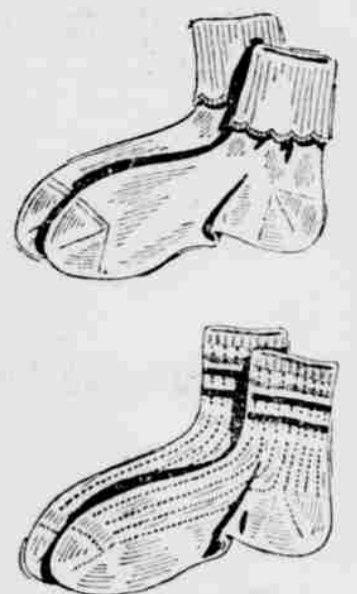
