**Ask King Quit**

Naples, Nov. 2. (UP)—Premier Marshal Pietro Badoglio has informed King Victor Emmanuel that leaders of the resurrected Italian political parties of Naples favor his abdication and that of Crown Prince Humbert because of their former acceptance of fascism, authoritative reports said today.

Badoglio, a staunch monarchist, carried out his awkward assignments at meeting with Victor Emmanuel somewhere in southern Italy, where he had gone to submit a list of proposed members of a new coalition

cabinet—including anti-monarchist elements.

He informed the king these reports said that there is an increased sentiment among Naples political leaders to turn over the throne to Humbert's six-year-old son, the prince of Naples.

Badoglio was understood to have advised the king to continue in power until the allied armies have captured Rome, so the monarchy issue will not be precipitated until a majority of the Italian people have an opportunity to voice their will.
