Approve Bill For Muster Out Pay For Service Men

Scale Set Ranged From \$300 to \$500 for the Men That are Leaving Service Under Honor

Washington, Dec. 11. (UP)—The Senate Military Affairs committee today unanimously approved a bill providing mustering out pay ranging from \$200 to \$500 for service men returning to civilian life.

Under the senate bill, pay would go to all service men with the rank of army colonel or navy commander and below who are discharged or relieved of active duty under honorable conditions. The scale of pay would be the following:

\$500 for more than 18 months overseas service; \$400 for more than 12 months but less than 18 months overseas service; \$300 for less than 12 months overseas service or more than 12 months service in the continental limits of the United States; \$200 for less than 12 months service within this country.

The pay scale was taken from a bill introduced yesterday by Senator Styles Bridges, R. N. H., and Warren R. Austin, R. Vt., and attached to the original bill by senate democratic leader, Tiben W. Barkley of Kentucky. Barkley's bill would have provided a flat \$300 payment to service men with the rank of army captain or navy senior lieutenant or below.

The substitute also provides for installment payment—one-third on the date of discharge and one-third in each of the following two months. No estimate has been made on how much the program will cost, but under the Barkley formula the estimated cost was approximately \$3,600,000,000. Approximately 600,000 service men already discharged would be eligible for payments immediately.

Turkish Relations Better

London, Dec. 9. (UP)—Turkish relations with America, Britain and Russia were strengthened considerably at the Cairo conference. Foreign Minister Numan Menemencioglu reported today from Ankara, but apparently he ruled out the likelihood of Turkey entering the war at once.

Turkish advisors quoted Menemencioglu as expressing deep satisfaction with the conference, at the same time proclaiming Turkey's attitude as unchanged.

A statement by the foreign minister after his return from Cairo made it evident that President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill had not convinced the Turks that full scale Turkish help Germany would aid the allies effectively at this time.

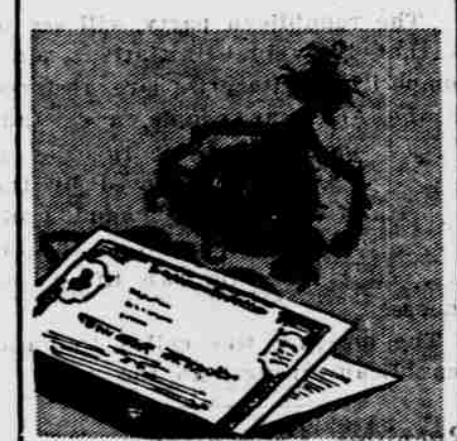
