Ordinance Covering Municipal Water Plant Passed

Council Enacts New Measure to Govern Operation of Plant—Dis- cuss Paving Plans

The city council last evening passed on its third reading ordinance 770, better known as the water ordinance, that will in the future govern the operation of the plant under municipal management. The ordinance was prepared after a great deal of study by the board of public works and combines many of the features of similar ordinances in different cities of the state.

Another old and familiar figure appeared before the council in the bill of the H. H. Henningson Engineering Co., for \$250 for engineering services to the city in the matter of the condemnation of the water plant. As before, the matter was referred to City Attorney A. L. Tidd, who held that the city was not obligated as the provisions had never been carried out by the company and the city. This reply will be transmitted to the Henningson company.

The meeting being the first of the month there were reports from the various officers for the month of January. City Treasurer M. D. Brown showed that the city balance was \$26,276.66, including the amount of \$15,000 in war bonds purchased by the city. City Clerk Albert Olson had a report showing that in the month he had collected \$41.55 for the city. Chief of Police Noah Parker reported that in the past month there had been one arrest, fines of \$19, three sleepers at jail and four dogs killed. Police Judge C. L. Graves reported for the week of February 13th there had been one arrest and fines and costs of \$13.25 collected.

Mrs. L. W. Egenberger rental collector for the city, reported that the city owned property on South 4th street had brought in \$58 in rental and less repairs and commissions, the sum of \$41.55 had been turned over to the city.

A communication was received from Ray C. Johnson, state auditor, relative to the operation of LB-52, covering the preparation of municipal and county budgets. These budgets must be in the office of the auditor by April 3rd. The matter was referred to the finance committee of the council.

City Clerk Olson was instructed to pay the delinquent tax of city property in Stadelman's addition near Gold street.

On the suggestion of Councilman J. E. Schutz, the matter of looking up a cab for the city maintainer will be taken up at once. It was reported that a cab of this type was owned by the company selling the maintainer to the city.

The repair and maintaining of Chicago avenue was brought up in a letter from Mayor R. B. Hayes to the council. The mayor reported that before himself and others could reach Lincoln to call on the governor, Governor Griswold had been called out of the state, so that it had been impossible to take up the resurfacing or plans with the highway department. Mr. Hayes stated that he had contacted Herbert Schwander, the engineer in charge of the Cass and Otoe county maintenance, who had told of the excellent results of the use of rock asphalt in handling resurfacing jobs in Nebraska City, showing the mayor the result of the work. Mr. Hayes was very much pleased at the excellent result and the comparative cheap cost of the surfacing. It was pointed out by the mayor that the repaving was almost out of question while the war was on, but the temporary repairs could be done on the avenue as soon as warmer weather arrived. The cost was estimated by Mr. Hayes at \$175 for material for Chicago avenue and \$225 for the labor cost.

Waldo. It was there that his wife passed away. He was greatly interested in civic and government affairs and kept up with the times as few older men have done. He was a member of the Methodist church and greatly interested in all church work. He leaves to mourn his passing, four children, William, of Elmwood; Roy, of Alvo; Mrs. Gollaher and Miss Gladys Coatman, of Grand Island. Ten grandchildren and one brother, Z. A. Coatman, of Avoca.
