Dr. Rosenlof has been recognized as one of the ablest educational leaders not only within the state but throughout the country, and has been very prominent as an official in many national, state, and local groups. At the present time he is secretary of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Who's Who in America reports a long list of achievements and recognitions that have come to him in recent years. As a speaker he is recognized as outstanding and is in constant demand.

The University educator and administrative officer is a native Nebraskan and has served in a considerable number of different positions in the schools of Nebraska during the last thirty years including eight years in the public schools as a superintendent and principal and classroom teacher, seven years in the State Department of Public Instruction as Director of Secondary Education and Teacher Training, and more than twenty years in the University of Nebraska. He holds degrees from Hastings College, University of Nebraska, and Columbia University.
