

Commissioners Proceedings Cass County, Nebr.

SESSION OF JUNE 1, 1944

Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present H. C. Beckemeyer, S. T. Gilmour, and G. W. Hart, County Commissioners, Geo. R. Sayles, County Clerk.

Minutes of the last session approved, when the following business was transacted in regular form:

RESOLUTION of County Board Approving Withdrawal of Securities

RESOLVED, that whereas the deposit of this county in Farmers State Bank of Avoca do not exceed \$25,834.94, said bank is entitled to and is hereby permitted to withdraw the following securities held in escrow by First National Bank of Omaha, Nebr., (trustee) to secure deposits of this county in said bank, to-wit:

\$1,800.00 Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation Bonds No. 120151-A, 1M Denomination; 20876-F, 5C Denomination; No. 511892-B, 93C, 94-D, 1C Denomination; 3 per cent due 2-15-49/44 with 11-15-42 s.o.a.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Treasurer is hereby instructed that the maximum amount of deposits to which said bank is entitled is thereby reduced and that the county deposits in said bank shall not exceed the sum of \$33,600.00 until additional securities, approved by this board, have been deposited with said trustee as security for county deposits.

The foregoing resolution was moved by Com. G. W. Hart and seconded by Com. S. T. Gilmour, and on the roll call, the vote was as follows: Ayes: H. C. Beckemeyer, S. T. Gilmour, G. W. Hart.

The chairman declared the resolution adopted this 1st day of June, 1944.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS, several bridges on Cass County, Nebraska roads have been damaged by a sudden casualty, to-wit: flood waters; and

WHEREAS, said bridges need repair on account of said high water; and

WHEREAS, it appears necessary to make additional appropriations to meet said repairs as are essential to the preservation and maintenance within the County of public safety;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that a emergency exists because of the immediate need of repairs on said bridges belonging to Cass County, Nebraska and for the preservation and maintenance within Cass County of public safety; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Board of Cass County, Nebraska give notice of its intention to repair such damages by at least one publication in some newspaper of general circulation in the County;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that at the time the Cass County Board makes the annual levy for County General Purposes, that a levy of not to exceed two-tenths (2/10) of one mill upon the Dollar valuation upon the property within said County be made and that said levy be known as the "special emergency bridge levy."
