The cast and the new production is young and somewhat inexperienced but collectively these kids have what it takes. Classy left-handed passing will be supplied by "Lindy Wolever," a senior. Wolever lettered last season. Wolever should indeed be the offensive stalwart, he is fast and shifty and when he's in the game he will fill the field with fleet feet and well flipped leather.

The runners will be on the small side. Capt. Joe Gradoville, 145 lbs., and Lloyd Tritsch, these boys are light, but—"Oh My!" Both lettered last season and Joe excels on defense. At fullback, Ray Beverage, a returning regular, sways forth. Summing up the backfield—it is small but very fast.

A seasoning of experience is available along the line. In Duane Sack the Plattsmouth lads think they have one of the real top notch tacklers in the state. At the other tackle young Schlieske sways about. Schlieske, who is but 15, weighs 204 and critics say he is fairly fast. He was a squad member last year.

At the guard will return John Conis whom we expect to humiliate the opponents with his bull-like rushes.

At center there is no experience. Bob Woods, a letterman, at guard last autumn, is being groomed. He has picked up some 30 lbs. in that time, but oh up and coming "Snow" Krejci expects to fill the bill. Krejci, at but 135 lbs., expects to make up for his weight with speed and aggressiveness. He was a squad member last year.

The ends, a green sorrel-topped Vroman has joined the Navy and Rich Livingston decided he would take his muscles through a military school. The ends may be fair and Coach Stewart cannot expect another Livingston and Vroman for many moons. At the present Cullen, Cole and Eaton look best, and it has been hinted that if Woods beats Krejci out of the pivot spot, Krejci will supplant his speed and brawn at one flank.

## BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS Plattsmouth, Nebraska

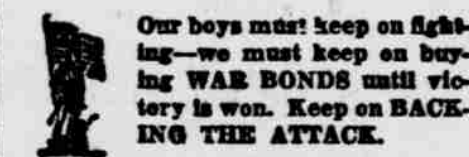

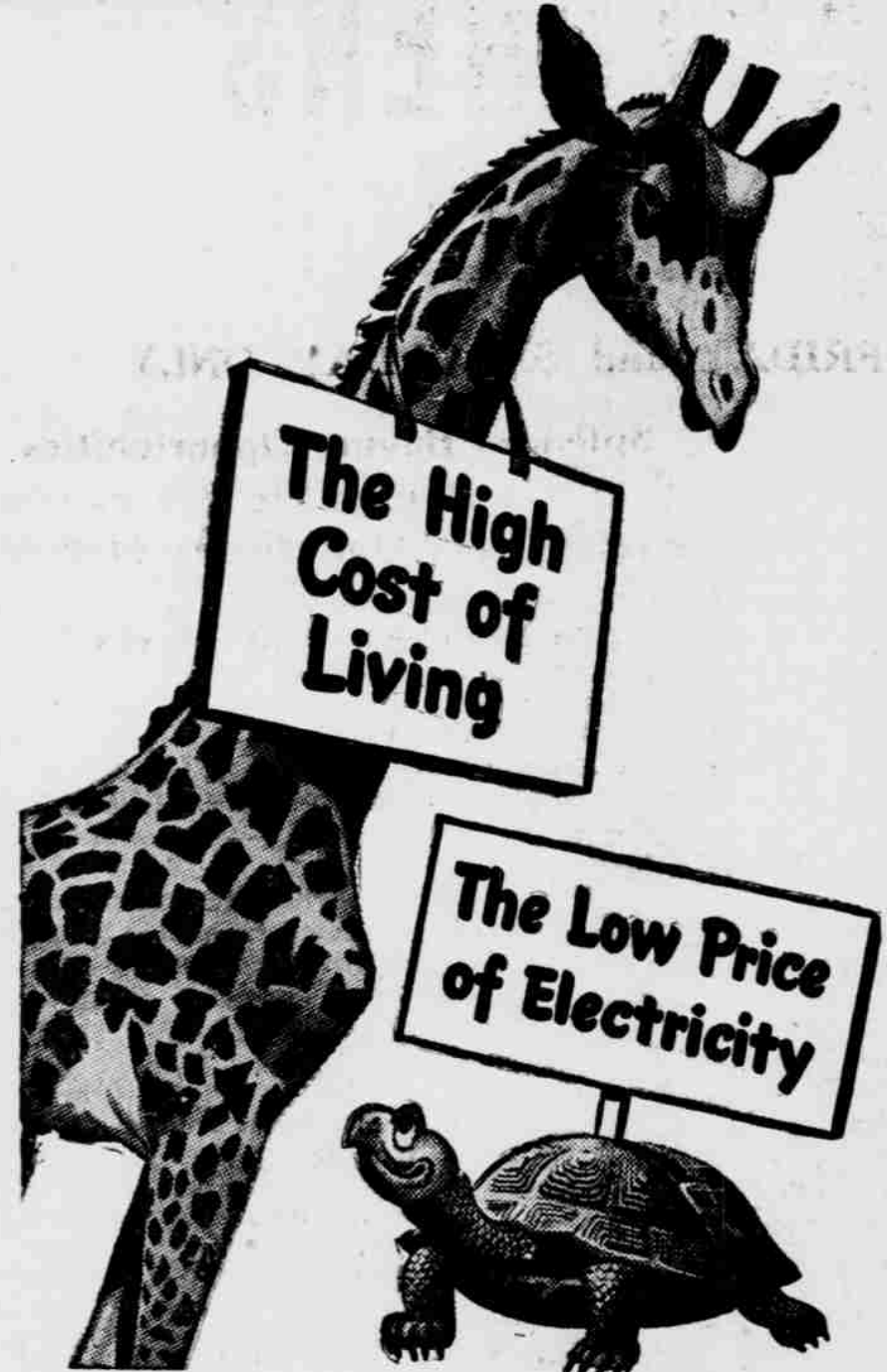
A partisan communique indicated the Germans were regrouping for an all out attack against the underground army.
