U. S. First Army Headquarters, Sept. 20. (UP)—Violent fighting of the close-quarter "Cassino" type was raging today in Stolberg, industrial city five miles east of Aachen, with the Americans battling forward slowly.

The Germans were counter attacking in several sectors of the First army front, and using flame throwers at some points. Widespread demolition was reported in encircled Aachen.
