Mrs. Levi Whitaker
 Mrs. Levi W. Whitaker, 49, resident of Bellevue for the past three years, died at Clarkson hospital, in Omaha, Monday, November 20. Ethel Fern Fitzpatrick was born April 26, 1895, at Effington, Kansas, and came to Weeping Water, with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Fitzpatrick, when only four months old. She attended Weeping Water schools, graduating in the class of 1913, and taught in rural schools for three years. December 5, 1916 she was married to Levi W. Whitaker, and they made their home in Weeping Water for the first five years after their marriage, after which they moved to Fremont, where their

three children, Lowell, Norris and Bonny Jean were born. Three years ago they moved to Bellevue. Surviving beside her husband, are her three children, six brothers, Donald Fitzpatrick, now serving with the army air corps, in England, John Fitzpatrick, Union, James Fitzpatrick, Nebraska City, Wilbur Fitzpatrick, PO3c, Weeping Water, stationed at Farragut, as cook, Clyde Fitzpatrick, and Arthur Fitzpatrick, Weeping Water, and two sisters, Mrs. Dean Duncan, Nebraska City, and Mrs. Marvin Troughbaugh, Los Angeles. All were present at the funeral except Ronald Fitzpatrick, serving with the air corps in England.

Funeral services were held at the Weeping Water Congregational church, Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock, with the services conducted by Rev. J. B. Douthitt, of Bellevue, assisted by the local pastor, Rev. John H. Pryor. Special songs were sung by Mrs. Henry Ruhbe and Mrs. Herbert Ratnour, accompanied by Mrs. Eugene Ludwig

at the organ. Pallbearers were Robert Cole, Seth Cole, L. R. Lane, Ralph Lane, Neil Fitzpatrick and Sterling Wiles. Interment was in Oakwood cemetery. Hobson's Funeral Home was in charge of funeral arrangements.

Highlighting all other news in this community, the latter part of last week, was the burning of the Paul Girard home, Friday morning. This beautiful farm home was built in 1917 at a cost of \$4,500, by Mr. Girard, and he and his sister, Miss Rossie Girard have enjoyed the home which was modern in every way. Friday morning, between eight and nine o'clock, Miss Girard discovered that the roof was in fire. Mr. Girard was away from home working on an adjoining farm. The Weeping Water fire department was called, but neighbors were on the scene almost immediately, helping in every way possible. Mr. Girard reported that almost everything of value on the first floor and in the basement, was saved, and some bedding and a few other things on the second floor. Miss Girard and some neighbors attempted to save more things on the second floor and Miss Girard was trapped by the flames, and unable to get back down the stairway, so had to be rescued by jumping from a second story window, and landed on a mattress held by the firemen. The furniture which was saved was taken to a vacant house in the neighborhood, where it will be stored until they can decide what to do. At present Mr. Girard and his sister, Miss Rossie, are at the home of friends, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Blakie.

The high school pep club feel quite elated over the results of their carnival, which was held Tuesday evening at the school house, to raise money for the senior banquet, this year. Total proceeds were \$149.00 with a few dollars expense, and the evening was thoroughly enjoyed by all present.

W. H. Taylor Dies Suddenly Near Plainview, Nebr.
 For Many Years A Resident of South of This City and Member of a Pioneer Family

W. H. Taylor, better known as "Jake," a resident of Cass County for a great many years and a member of one of the pioneer families of the county, died the past week at Plainview, Nebraska, as the result of a sudden heart attack.

Mr. and Mrs. Taylor who reside at Gordon, Nebraska, had gone to Brunswick, Nebraska about two weeks ago to visit at the home of a daughter, Mrs. William Hoffort.

While Mr. Taylor had not been very well of late years he apparently felt as well as usual on Sunday and death came very suddenly about three miles from Plainview when he was riding in a car enroute to a Sunday dinner engagement.

Mr. Taylor was born and raised near Plattsmouth, when he moved to Plainview and from there to Gordon, where he was engaged in farming until a few years ago when he moved into the town of Gordon to make his home.

The deceased is survived by his wife, two daughters and one son, Mrs. L. E. Taylor, Gordon, Nebraska, Mrs. William Hoffort of Brunswick and Wayne Taylor of Rushville, Nebraska. He is also survived by three sisters and one brother, Mrs. Nelle Furlong, Steamboat Spring, Colorado, Mrs. G. W. Pugsley of Bayard, Nebraska, Mrs. J. L. Stamp, Omaha and Charles E. Taylor of Waukomis, Oklahoma.

The funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at the Methodist church at Gordon.
