Death Comes To Chas. J. Vorndran Thursday Night

Resident of the Community for More Than Forty Years Suffers Stroke Wednesday

Thursday evening at 9:20 at his home in this city, Charles J. Vorndran, 83, passed away after several years of failing health, in the past month his condition being very feeble and culminating in a cerebral hemorrhage Wednesday night.

Mr. Vorndran was born at Tiffin, Ohio, February 16, 1861, spending his earlier years in that part of the nation, later coming west and has since made his home in the middle west.

He came to Plattsmouth some forty years ago where his brother, John Vorndran, was located, making his home here and was engaged in working in the local Burlington shops, later engaging in work on many of the farms in this section of Cass county and was with the late A. S. Will for many years.

Mr. Vorndran also homesteaded near St. Francis, Kansas, for a short time but later returned to Plattsmouth and in the more recent years has retired from active work.

He is survived by a brother, Joseph A. Vorndran, New Washington, Ohio, a half sister, Mrs. Clara Nause of Meridian, Mississippi, and a niece, Mrs. John Clodt, of this city.

The body is at the Caldwell funeral home at 7th and Oak streets, where the Rosary will be recited this evening at 8 o'clock.

The funeral services will be Saturday at 9:30 at the St. John's Roman Catholic church, of which Mr. Vorndran was a faithful member for years. The interment will be at the Catholic cemetery.


