Glenwood was held scoreless during the third period. The Plattsburgh reserves led by Larry Thimagan with 11 points and Dwight Atteberry with 10 points, made a clean 1945 start with a 32-23.

Cass County Has Received \$255,913 In FHA Loans

Loans for the Purpose of Building, Buying or Refinancing Homes in the County

Cass County people have obtained insured F. H. A. loans in the amount of \$255,913 in the ten years since Federal Housing Administration has been insuring loans in Nebraska, according to county-by-county figures just released by Holger Holm, area director of the Federal Housing Administration at Omaha.

"These loans," said Mr. Holm, "are for the purpose of buying homes, building homes, refinancing mortgages on homes or repairing or remodeling real property. The loans are made by local and other lending institutions and insured against loss by Federal Housing Administration."

Of the volume in Cass County, \$199,600 was for buying and refinancing or building homes, and \$56,313 was for repairing and remodeling.

The Federal Housing Administration has insured 38,283 loans in Nebraska in the total amount of \$59,242,518 from June 30, 1934 to June 30 1944.
