

The remarkable photos above, taken at the Army's Frankfort Arsenal, Philadelphia, Pa., were made at one-millionth of a second exposure by a new superspeed X-ray machine, made possible by a new electronic tube developed by Dr. Charles M. Slack of the Westinghouse Lamp Division. The photos show that a high explosive shell inflates to twice its normal diameter just before it bursts while penetrata steel plate.


