New World Court May Find Home In the Hague

Committee of Jurists Decide on Move But Await the Decision of Full Conference

WASHINGTON, (U.P.)—Informal agreement to set up the new world court at its old site—

The Hague in the Netherlands today renewed speculation about the eventual home of the new world security organization.

The committee of United Nations jurists, meeting here to revise the old world court statute for presentation to the San Francisco conference, has agreed that the new court should return to the Hague. The final decision will rest with the full conference.

The Hague has been associated for a half century—ever since the first Hague peace conference in 1899—with man's attempt to set up a workable international tribunal for peaceful settlement of disputes.

But the decision on the "capital" of the world organization will not be so easy. The most prominently mentioned cities to date include Geneva, site of the League of Nations, Washington, Vienna, Prague, Trieste and Quebec. Against that is President Roosevelt's expressed desire to have the "world capital" move each year.

That will be one of the relatively unimportant but difficult questions the United Nations will have to answer at San Francisco. The latest suggestion came from London where the delegates of the British Commonwealth of nations are meeting for pre-conference talks. Many of them were naming Washington as their first choice and a Canadian city, probably Quebec, as their second.

Some British officials were said to feel that the American people probably would play a more active role in the new organization if it were in the United States. They haven't forgotten 1920.

Geneva has been virtually ruled out despite the \$10,000,000 League

of Nations buildings there. There are three major objections—(1) Switzerland's neutrality throughout this war and her reservations respecting neutrality even to membership in the old league; (2) her lack of diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia; (3) The association of Geneva with the league's failures.

Resistance May Halt Relief Work

Washington, (U.P.)—Congress was told today that prolonged resistance by isolated Nazi units may delay indefinitely the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administrations program for Europe.

President Roosevelt's second report to congress on United States participation in UNRRA said the relief agency may have to wait for the allies to "clean up pockets of resistance" before more than the present token relief can be channeled into liberated Europe.

It may be pointed out, however, that even under the full program the liberated areas could get only two percent of their relief and rehabilitation needs from UNRRA.

It revealed that up to December 31st, eleven countries had failed to complete their payments to UNRRA's \$10,000,000 administrative fund for 1944.

Would Rename Highway No. 6

Lincoln, Neb., (U.P.)—A resolution by Sens. William Crossland, Wayne Ed Hoyt, McCook and Earl J. Lees, Fremont, directing Nebraska to affix the name "Grand Army of the Republic" to U. S. highway No. 6 was introduced in the state legislature today.

Nebraska, Iowa, Utah and Nevada are the only states through which the coast-to-coast highway runs which have not so acted.

CHILDREN IN ARMY

London, April 11, (U.P.)—A German sergeant, a veteran of Russia, Crete, North Africa, Sicily and Italy, surrendered to a correspondent for the London Star on the 2nd army front. It was disclosed today.

"The oldest soldier in my platoon is 16," the sergeant said. "When they get into battle some of them call for their mothers. My lieutenant was 19 and had never seen active service until he was sent here. It is impossible to carry on with such soldiers."
