## Will Recruit for Merchant Marine

Omaha will be the scene of an intensive three-day recruiting drive by the U. S. Maritime Service on July 9, 10, and 11, Monday, through Wednesday of next week.

David J. Brecht, Lt. (j. g.) USMS, regional enrolling officer for Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Iowa and Nebraska, will set up recruiting headquarters in the Omaha U. S. Employment Service office at 210-212 South 18th Street.

"The end of the war in Europe has only intensified the job of the U. S. Merchant Marine," Lt. Brecht declared. "In addition to bringing our soldiers home from Europe as fast as possible, our men must deliver enormous amounts of material and manpower to knock out the Jap in the Pacific."

Men from 17 to 50 are eligible to enroll in the maritime service as apprentice seamen or steward's mates. Seamen applicants must have three and a half years of high school. Physical qualifications are less strict for the steward department.

Volunteers who want fast action should bring with them referral cards from their nearest employment service office, birth certificates, service discharge papers, and letters from their draft boards to explain any selective service "F" or "D" classifications.

After leaving Omaha, Lt. Brecht will conduct a second three-day campaign on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the remainder of the week, in the employment service office in Des Moines, Ia. This trip is part of a nationwide recruiting drive to obtain more men for sea duty in the merchant fleet.

## Slap Stick Comedy is Featured at Cass Theatre

Brilliantly written dialogue with lines that sparkle like flashes from the facets of a diamond have their proper place in the art of comedy, but the "situation" is still the secret of the chuckle. So states Sidney Lanfield, director of "Bring On The Girls," the new Technicolor musical comedy film arriving Sunday at the Cass Theatre.

"But slapstick," Lanfield went on, "the good old-fashioned custard pie-in-the-face routine, produces the real side-splitting laughter."

Illustrating his statement about slapstick and "situations," Lanfield cited one scene in the film which co-stars Eddie Bracken, Veronica Lake, Sonny Tufts and Marjorie Reynolds, in which Bracken who supposedly can't swim has to climb to the very top of a diving tower and take a header into the swimming pool. Bracken shaking like an aspen, suddenly discovers that he is wearing his wrist watch. He carefully takes it off, tucks it under the belt of his swimming trunks and leaps into the water.

In another scene Lanfield puts Bracken through the stickiest, slappiest bit of funny business in the actor's career, straight slapstick but with a very definite undertone of pathos.

## FEPC Squabble Stops Pay-Day of Many Employes

WASHINGTON, (UPI)—Congressional bickering over the fair employment practices committee Thursday threatened to tie up paychecks of thousands of employes in nearly a score of government agencies.

Administration leaders abandoned hope of completing action this week on the \$752,000,000 war agencies appropriation bill for 1946 as southern Democrats refused to give in to demands to include funds for FEPC.

Under a previously approved measure, all agencies except FEPC may continue to incur obligations until the appropriation bill is passed. But a spokesman for the general accounting office said that pending final action on the measure, no money may be withdrawn from the treasury to meet payrolls for the fiscal year which began July 1.

Government payrolls are on a staggered basis, with Friday the scheduled payday for four of the agencies, the office of scientific research and development, office of economic stabilization, office of scientific research and development, office of economic stabilization, office of defense transportation and the controversial FEPC. The house was expected to approve an amended version of the war agencies bill Thursday, possibly after knocking out as much as \$643,000,000 of the \$752,000,000 total before sending it on to the Senate.
