Scoundrel in Film, Rathbone Actually Charitable Person

Did you ever wonder how the actor who rates the hisses in a picture feels about his job? Basil Rathbone, who plays the villainous Rockingham in Paramount's film adaptation of Daphne du Maurier's best seller, "Frenchman's Creek," coming to the Cass Theater, is a very good citizen who has his finger in more charitable pies than most actors in Hollywood, yet he would rather play the heavy than the hero any day.

"In fiction, unfortunately, the heavy is almost always portrayed as a man of greater intelligence than the hero," says Rathbone. "Why that should be, I do not presume to know. Certainly I wouldn't dream of suggesting that it is also true in real life. Real life is played in shades of gray, let us say. Playwrights and screen writers use black and white. Too often their good men are impossibly good—and a little stupid.

"For another thing, the so-called heavy characters are usually clear cut. The motive behind their moves is easily discernible. As an actor I'd rather be wrong and definite than right and indefinite."

Rathbone's current role is one of the smoothest, suavest and most intelligent villains he ever played. As Rockingham, he pursues the heroine, Joan Fontaine, with unwelcome attention and, frustrated, brings about the capture of her lover, Arturo de Cordova.
