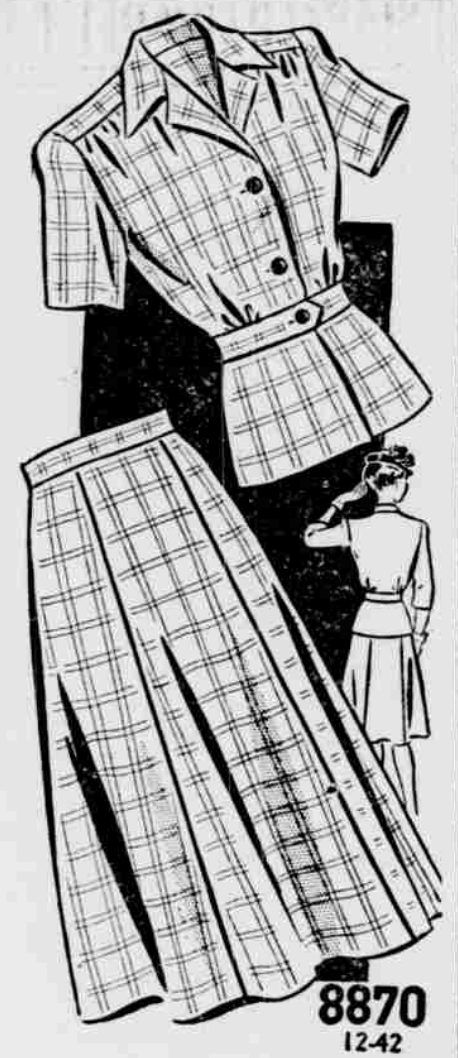

**Sgt. McGale's Outfit Set for Redeployment**

**ASSEMBLY AREA COMMAND, FRANCE**—The 3543rd ordnance medium automotive maintenance company, after completing its share in solving transportation problems upon which depended the allied victory over Germany, is now processed for redeployment through Camp Cleveland of the assembly area command in France.

Landing in southern France in November, 1944, the company set up and operated maintenance shops, a parts depot and wrecker service at an advance supply headquarters, keeping thousands of trucks rolling along the vital supply lines to the U. S. 7th and 1st French armies.

The company ran shops handling small arms, leather and canvas and carpentry, in addition to its automotive services, working in Marseille, Langres and Metz, in France, and in Ludwigshafen and Ulm in Germany.

The unit's last operational assignment was the supervision of the Daimler-Benz truck manufacturing plant in Mannheim, producing vehicles for allied use.

Among the men serving in the company is Sgt. Norman H. McGale, 1038 South 9th St., Plattsmouth, Neb.
