Survivors Tell Of Fire and Rape At Hands of Japs

MANILA, (UP)—Survivors told a military tribunal Thursday that Japanese soldiers burned alive a former Filipino Supreme Court Justice and 14 of his friends and repeatedly raped 40 of Manila's most beautiful and socially-prominent women.

The tribunal must decide whether Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita Japanese commander in the Philippines in 1944 and 1945, shall die for the mass rape, torture and murders committed by his forces during an eight-day reign of terror before the American Liberation of Manila last February.

Women and girls ravished as many as 15 times during that week of horror confronted Yamashita in the courtroom and told in all its revolting detail the story of their enforced shame. Press and public were barred from the session, but the digest of the women's testimony was made available later.

The story of the burning alive of 15 residents of a section of Manila known as Pax court was told by Dr. Walter K. Frankel, a German Jew Refugee, after the court was re-opened to the public for the afternoon session.

Frankel testified that the Japanese altogether rounded up 19 inhabitants of Pax Court, including former Supreme Court Justice Antonio Villareal, Mrs. Villareal, Frankel himself and Mrs. Frankel.

"They tied our hands behind our backs and gathered us in a semi-circle in a corner of one room," he said. "They made us kneel face downward while they pulled furniture in the room about us and spread gasoline on the cushions of the furniture.

"Then a Jap hurled a grenade. It killed Villareal and started a fire."

Frankel said Mrs. Villareal fell across her husband's body with a scream, "whereupon a Jap shot her in the neck."

Mrs. Frankel gasped, "My God!" and another Jap shot her through the neck, Frankel said.

"She was killed and her blood went all over me," he testified. Frankel said another woman in the group succeeded in untying his hands despite her own bonds, then he untied the woman's hands and they and two others escaped through the flames after the Japanese left.

Another witness testified in the killing of two American civilians, Henry and Tony Daland. They both were slain by Japanese who fired their home, the witness said.

Testimony during the closed morning session revealed that the Japanese gathered 400 socially-prominent Manila residents in a public square Feb. 9 and separated the men from the women and girls.

The Japanese then chose 20 "young, good-looking girls," took them to a cafe and piled them with food and liquor, then assembled them on an upper floor of the swanky Bayview hotel.

Japanese officers and enlisted men took their choice of the girl-forced them into single rooms and raped them. Many were virgins of only 12 or 14.

The same procedure was followed for the next six days at the Bayview hotel. Some women and girls were ravished in the main dining room in the presence of others detained by the Japanese.

Other girls were taken to the Boulevard, Alhambra and Miramar apartments for similar mass rape. Altogether, the orgy continued for eight days, with the victims including Filipinos, Chinese, Russians and Spanish.

A miss "N" testified that she complained to a Japanese Lieutenant named Kito, but he said the men were from the front lines and could do as they desired.

In his Sept. 5 message, the president urged the democratic house senate not to make that transfer. The veto need not prevent economy. Mr. Truman doubtless already is instructing all spending departments that they must cut back their share of the proposed \$52,500,000,000 even though he does veto the bill which would enforce the cuts by law.

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Civil Service Placements High For War Veterans

More than 23,500 veteran placements — including placements of wives of disabled veterans and widows of veterans — were made in the Federal Service during September 1945, the U. S. Civil Service Commission announced today.

Approximately 700 of the placements were made in the Eighth U. S. Civil Service Region — comprising Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska and the United States and Canada were in equal partnership in the development of the atomic bomb.

Under questioning, the President said that Great Britain and Canada know as much about the mechanics of the actual production of the atomic bomb as this country.

This whole subject, he added, was the reason Prime Minister Clement Attlee was coming to this country next month.

Asked whether Attlee's talks here would be limited to this one topic, the President said, the British Prime Minister, could talk to him on anything he wants to.

No Secret Pact Made For Control of Atom

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Truman Wednesday described as untrue a report that the late president Roosevelt and former Prime Minister Winston Churchill had reached a secret agreement on peacetime control of the atomic bomb. The report of the secret agreement was made to the House of Commons in London Tuesday by Capt. A. R. Blackburn, labor member. The President said he did not think this statement was true.

Veteran placement continued

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to lead in the number of veteran placements for the month — 9,454. The Post Office Department was next with 5,293. Veterans were also placed in large numbers in the Navy and Treasury Departments and in the Veterans Administration.

The Commission also announced that more than 10,700 physically handicapped veterans had been placed in the Federal Service since July 1, 1943, 334 of that number in the Eighth Region.

In addition to new placements of veterans, the number of World War II veterans restored to positions in the Federal Service in accordance with provisions of the Selective Training and Service Act during August totaled 2,792. Veterans restored to duty since July 1, 1944, after military service, totaled 26,198.
